The Australia-Japan Society of NSW prize will be an annual feature of the awards presentations at the University of NSW School of Languages and Linquistics.

With AJS NSW contributing \$400 and the UNSW contributing a further \$100, the \$500 prize will be keenly sought after.

The Awards is for students who are taking Japanese as a major and who have demonstrated outstanding performance across their Japanese studies.

The Award will be given for the first time in April/May next year for outstanding performance in a student's 2010 studies.



Exciting opportunity in Kanazawa to learn Japanese language and culture in April 2011

Applications are now being accepted for the 2 week course in Japanese language/culture in Kanazawa.

The course will run for 2 weeks from 17th to 29th April next year and include language lessons, cultural activities and homestay accommodation with a Japanese family.

The program is being run by the Australia-Japan Society of ACT in conjunction with the Ishikawa Foundation for International Exchange.


Applicants must be at least 20 years of age, be a member of an Australia-Japan Society (or join one) and be prepared to stay in Japan for the duration of the course.

A new book takes an interesting look at society in Japan since 1989 when Emperor Akihito ascended the throne. "Contemporary Japan: History, Politics and Social Change since the 1980s" by Jeff Kingston looks at a range of issues from the start of the Heisei era, the economy, the movement in the part time and temporary workforce from 1/5th of the population to 1/3rd, the growing ageing population and the political climate and environment of the last 20 years.

"Contemporary Japan" is full of very useful dates and data.

From 22 – 28 November in Sydney at event Cinemas in George Street, the 14th Japanese Film Festival will feature the latest films straight from Japan.

The Opening Film *About Her Brother* (screening on Monday 22 November in Sydney) takes a wonderful look at the relationship which develops between Ginko and her younger brother Tetsuro, which progresses from her feelings of anger towards him and moves to a great story of love and tolerance when she finds out he is terminally ill.

The Closing Film **A Lone Scalpel** (screening in Sydney on Sunday 28 November) tells the story of Dr Touma who passes up a promising career in the medical elite to practice in a small city hospital. The issues he has to confront make the film very memorable.
